Approval of Consent Agenda

- The consent agenda will be voted on as a whole at the beginning of each meeting. Steering Committee members may request to move an item from the consent agenda to the regular agenda, if they feel it requires additional discussion.

- There being no changes needed, the consent agenda was approved by common consent.

2019 CoC Competition

- The NOFA was released on July 3
 - Complete CoC Application with Project Priority Listing is due September 30th at 8:00 PM
- Staff have set internal timelines:
 - Intent to Apply process closed July 17th
 - 13 agencies submitted by the deadline, and 9 of those were eligible to apply
 - First submission deadline was July 29th
 - 6 new agencies (with 7 projects) submitted materials by the first deadline.
 - This will give the Project Review Committee 41 applications to score. This is not inclusive of the HMIS, SSO-CE, and planning grants, which are not scored in the competition. However, the HMIS and SSO-CE renewal grants are ranked.
 - Second submission deadline is August 12th
 - This will begin the internal CoC scoring and ranking process with the Project Review Committee.
- The Project Review Committee will begin their process soon after the August 12th submission deadline.

- The Steering Committee needs to be available to approve the final ranking list.
 - September 4, 10:00-11:30 AM: The Steering Committee will meet to decide whether to approve the final prioritization ranking list recommended by the Project Review Committee.
 - We need to have quorum (at least 12 members) to conduct the vote to approve the list.
 - If a Regional Lead cannot attend, be sure to have the Regional Alternate attend.
 - Members who work for agencies that are applying for CoC funding this year cannot vote. For Regional Leads who work for an applicant agency, your region can have a vote by your Regional Lead Alternate as long as they are not also from an applicant agency. Encourage them to be there to vote.
 - Regional Leads or Alternates or at-large members who attend the Steering Committee meeting but must abstain from voting will count towards quorum as long as they are present at the meeting.
- Staff will complete the CoC Application and may be reaching out for information.
 - NCEEH serves as the Collaborative Applicant for the NC BoS CoC.
 - Staff often need information from stakeholders to complete the application.
 - Please respond as staff reach out to find out what great things are happening in your communities.
- Staff intend to submit the application early!
 - Staff aim to post the final CoC Application with the Project Prioritization Listing on September 24th to the NCEEH website. Staff will notify the CoC that the application has been posted via email
 - Staff hope to submit to HUD on September 27th.

Other Funding Opportunities

- Specialized Housing and Services for Victims of Human Trafficking NOFA
 - The purpose of this program is to enhance the quality and quantity of safe housing and specialized services available to assist victims of human trafficking.



- Organizations that demonstrate the ability to provide safe housing options and client-focused services for victims of human trafficking that result in obtaining and remaining in permanent housing situations with the necessary supportive services to ensure participant success for housing retention, that includes obtaining the necessary income to promote self-sufficiency, are encouraged to apply for this funding.

2019 Point in Time

Staff presented information on the 2019 PIT Count. All information is preliminary until finalized by HUD. The PIT count was conducted January 30, 2019.

- 240 agencies reported on people in shelter. The sheltered count was conducted using HMIS and a survey for agencies not using HMIS.
- Volunteers supported agencies and regional leads to conduct the unsheltered count using an electronic app on a smart device.
- NC Balance of State CoC staff coordinated and documented outcomes from the count

What is the preliminary data?

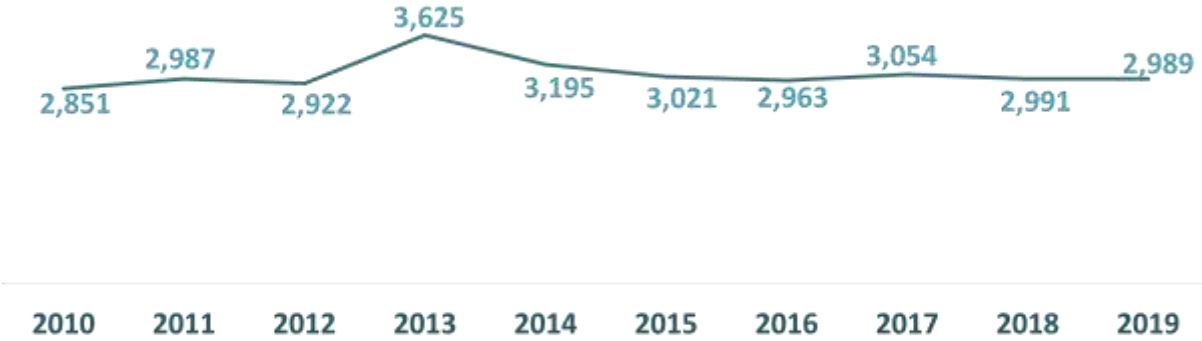
- Reflects all data collected for the sheltered & unsheltered count

- Will be reviewed by regional teams and HUD before it becomes final.



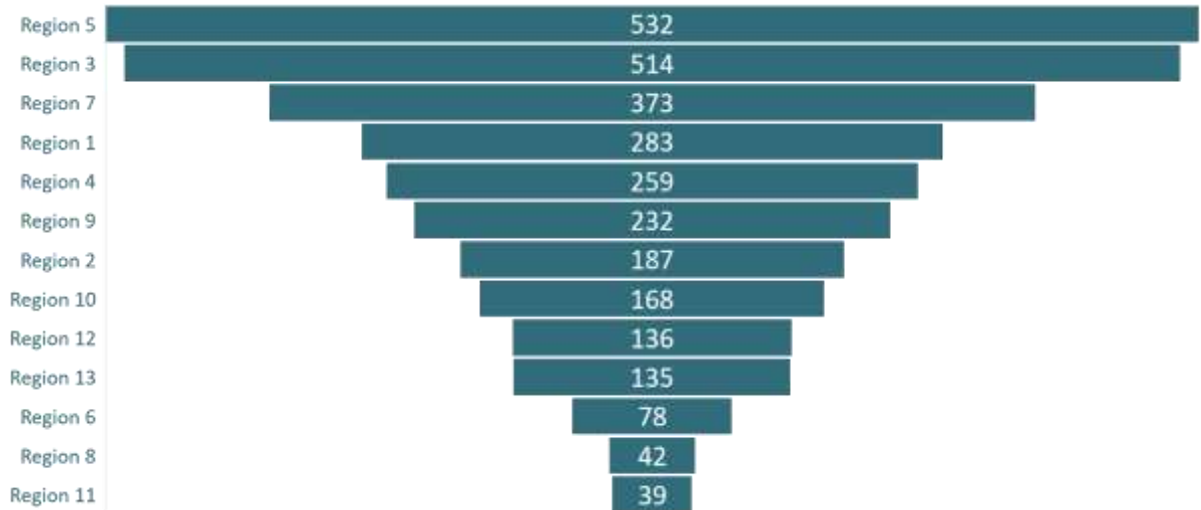
2,989 people in 2,304 households

 - 776 were people in families with at least one child
 - 2 were children in child-only households

The NC BoS CoC saw a 5% increase since 2010



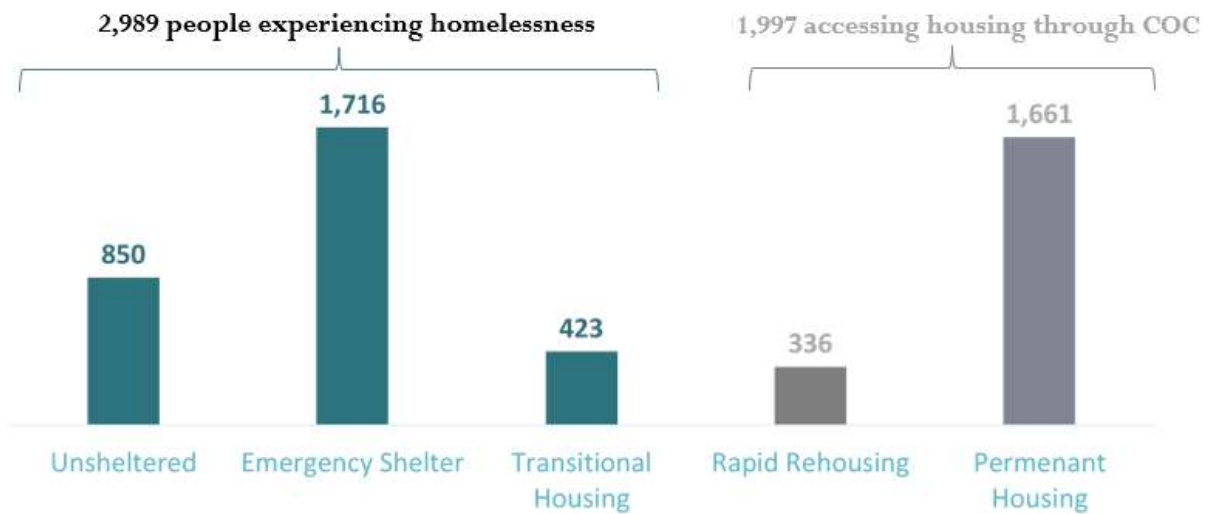
Total people counted by Region



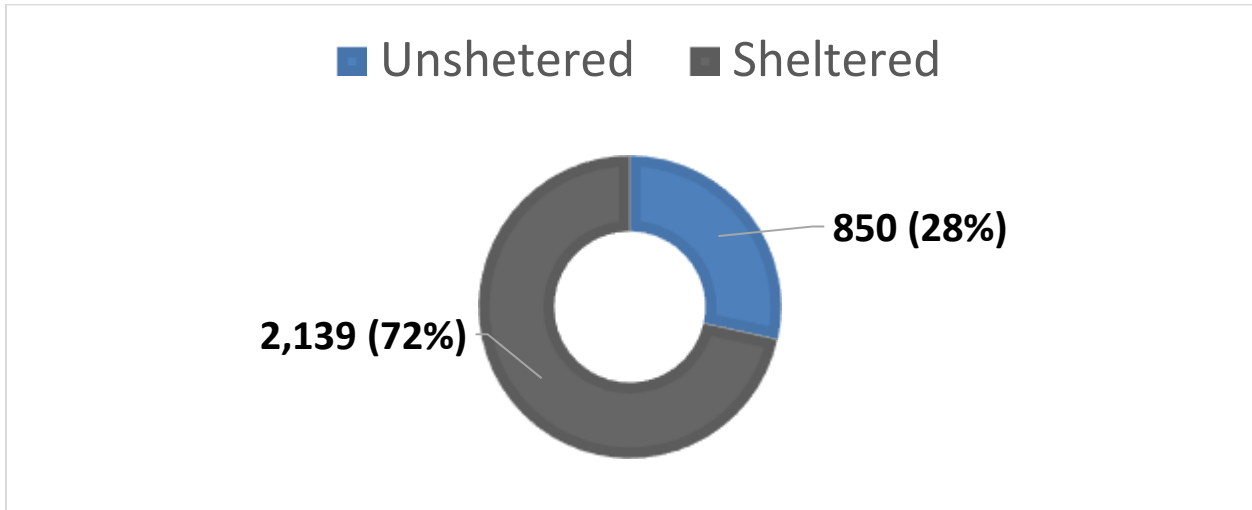

Total People Counted by Housing Status

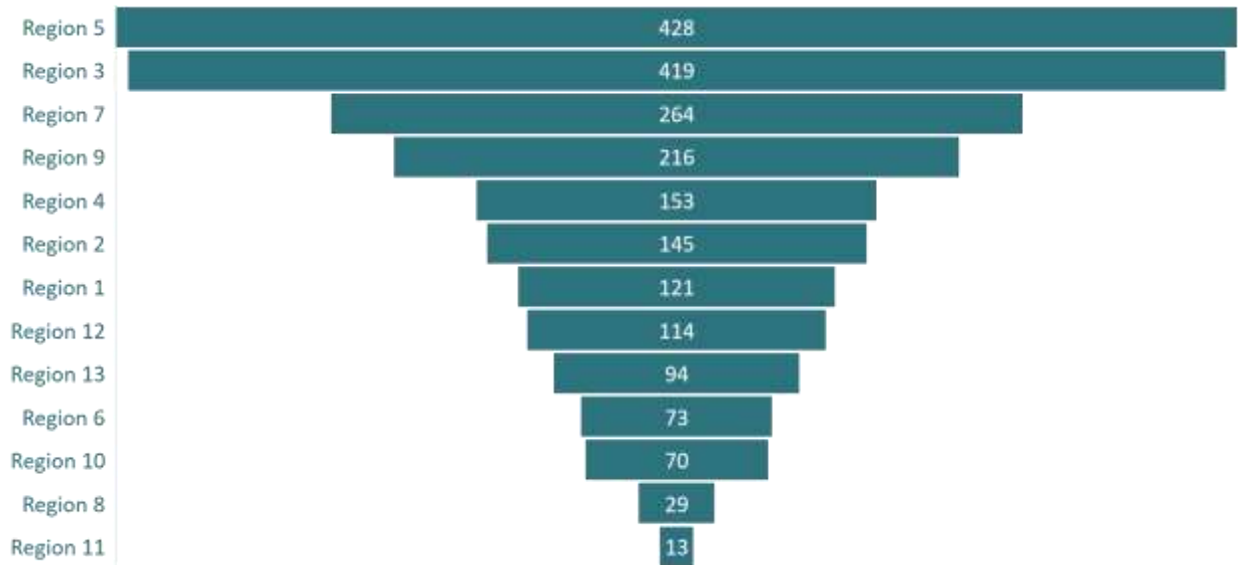


Sheltered and Unsheltered Comparison

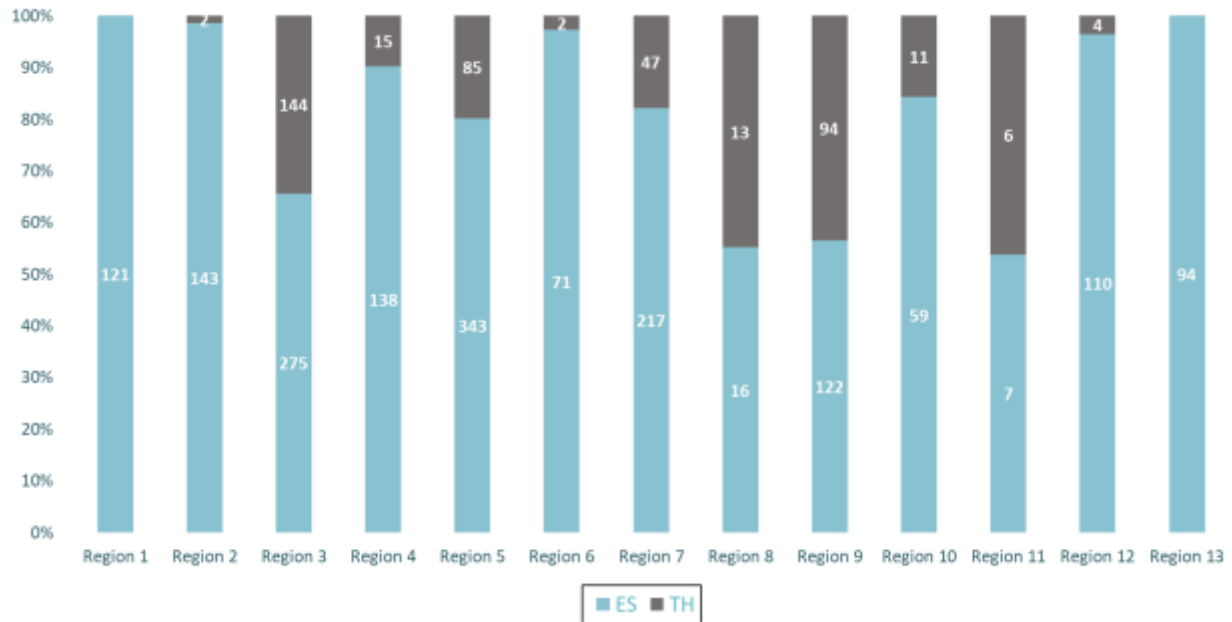


Sheltered Count by Region

Percent by Region – ES & TH

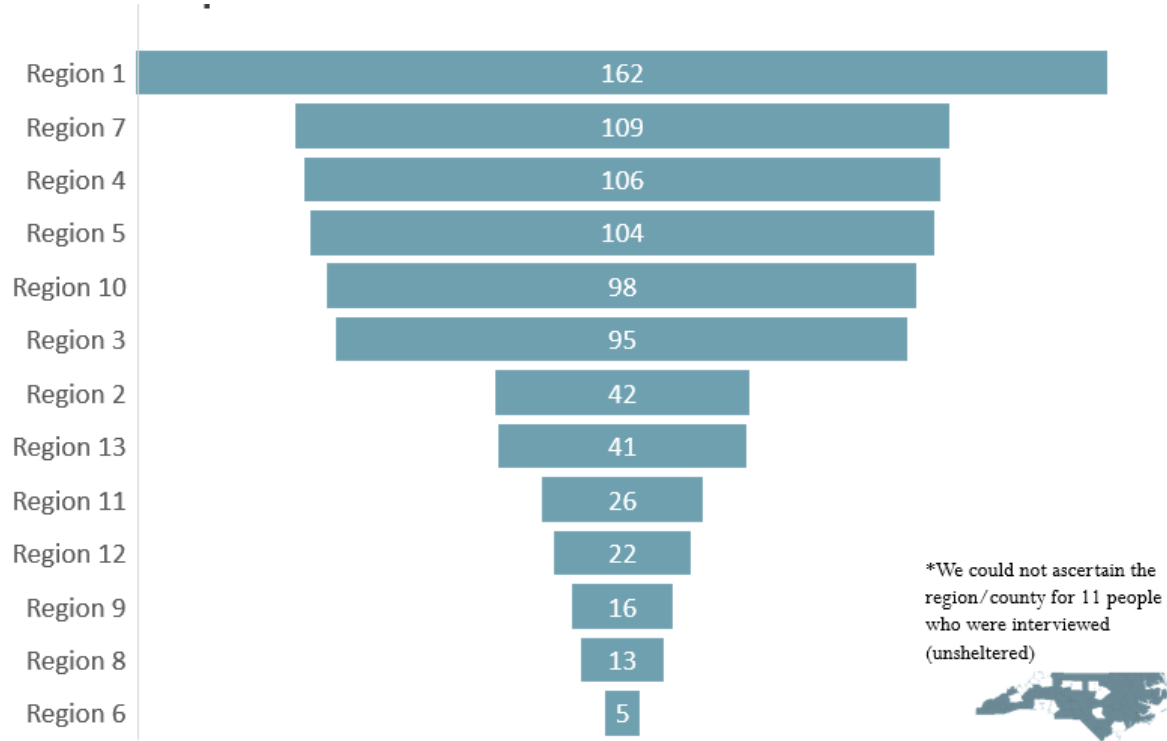

Race, Ethnicity and Gender

Acknowledging the lasting impact of systemic discrimination – such as racism and sexism - on current disparities in homelessness is an important first step toward addressing discrimination. The Point-In-



Time collects information about Race, Ethnicity, and Gender to help us start to identify disparities and ask questions.

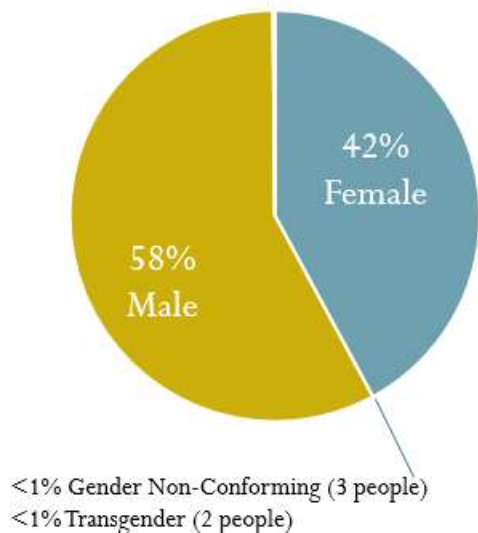
- Further research, using additional data sources, is needed to better understand the underlying causes of disparities.

Gender

Based on US Census 2018 Estimates, women make up 51% of everyone in the North Carolina. Women are *underrepresented* among people experiencing homelessness, especially when it comes to people who are unsheltered or in transitional housing.

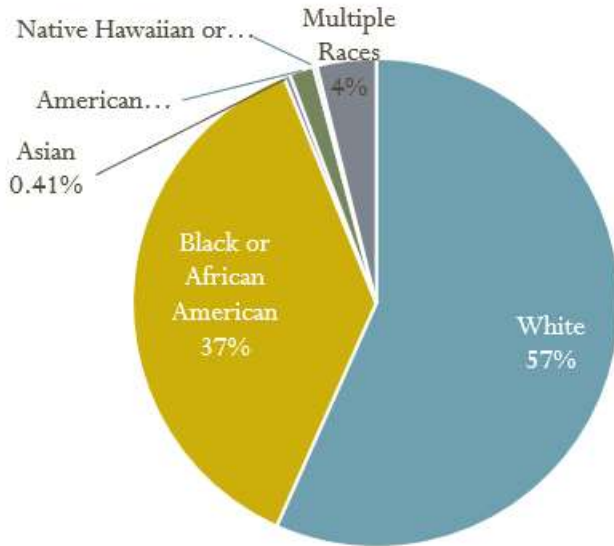
Race

There is a bigger percentage of people who identify as Black or African American experiencing homelessness than among everyone living in North Carolina. People identifying as Black or African American are *overrepresented* in the homeless population.

Ethnicity

2018 US Census estimates that 10% of everyone in North Carolina identifies as Hispanic or Latino – more than twice the percent of people who are Hispanic or Latino and experiencing homelessness. People who are Hispanic or Latino are *underrepresented* among the homeless population.

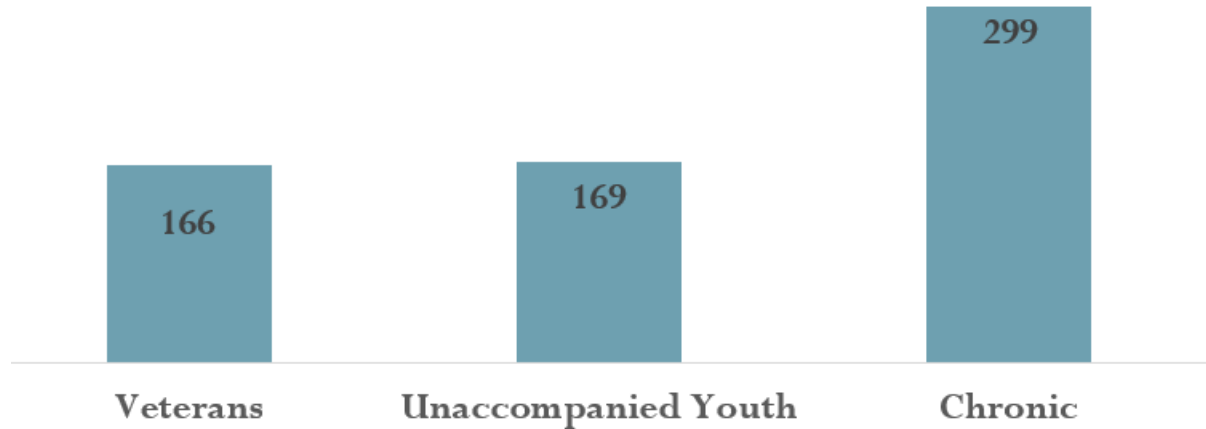
